

The Valemount Farmers' Market is a great opportunity to buy locally grown and raised fresh food, try some local baking and find locally made goodies of all sorts. We often have information booths from local services, you can grab some fresh made food for supper from a variety of vendors, listen to some music, and socialize.

The Valemount Farmers' Market was revived in 2012, and has run each summer since then, Thursdays from 4-7, from mid June until the end of September, in the field behind the Valemount Visitor Centre.

The Valemount Learning Society took over operation of the market in 2021. With our "Make it, Bake it, Grow it" rules, the market helps support local producers

and artisans, and the Nutrition Coupon Program from BC Farmers' Markets is a huge hit with seniors, low-income families, and pregnant people in the community. The program, funded by the Ministry of Health and supported by Columbia Basin Trust, helps get local fresh food like veggies, fruit, eggs, and meat to the community, and it supports the producers of these items by increasing their sales.

A study last year showed the Valemount Farmers' Market is a significant economic player in Valemount, injecting nearly \$358,600 annually into the local economy. The study, sponsored by the BC Association of Farmers' Markets in collaboration with Dr. David Connell of UNBC, showed the market received 9,125 visits annually.







The Benefits of Hügelkultur for your garden

Hügelkultur ("hill culture") is an old European growing method that and has seen a recent revival - for good reason! A hügelkultur bed is tall and mounded, consisting of logs and branches covered with compost and soil. The compost and woody materials break down over time, turning into organic matter that holds water and nutrients like a sponge. This could be particularly helpful if you have sandy, fast-draining soil; however, the tall raised hügelkultur beds could also help to improve drainage for heavy clay soils. In addition, it's a great way to use up wood waste that's currently lying around your property, while sequestering the carbon underground and posing less of a fire hazard than backyard burning. Because it uses existing wood waste and reduces the need to add water and fertilizers, hügelkultur is an extra sustainable gardening method! It is traditionally used for free-standing outdoor beds, but the same technique can be used in deep planters and greenhouses.

Start by piling logs (or other non-treated wood) where you want your new bed to be - preferably hardwoods, as too much

conifer wood can acidify the soil. If the wood is already rotting, that's even better! Once you have your log pile add finer woody material on top, starting with large branches and working your way down to small twigs. On top of this you can add dead leaves, grass clippings, and other fine yard or kitchen wastes (although you may want to avoid food scraps that could attract bears). Your mound might be quite high at this point, but it will settle over time as the wood decomposes. Depending on how dense your pile is, it could end up being less than half its original height in a few years – so as long as you can still reach the top, don't be afraid of making it too high! The more wood and other plant materials you add, the greater the water and nutrient retention benefits. Finally, top it off with a layer of soil deep enough to plant into. You can now plant your crops on top of the mound, and on the sides to increase your growing area and prevent erosion.

It can take quite a bit of time to build a hügelkultur bed, and you might not see the biggest results right away while you wait for the wood to start breaking down - but it's well worth the effort! Think of it as a long-term investment in your garden.



Inviting a Little Wild Into the Garden

Each spring I have a vision of a neatly maintained summer garden, with weeds kept in check and paths mowed. However, by the time August rolls around, the garden is always a riotous wild mess. The summer greens and herbs have shot into flower and gone to seed, grass and weeds fill the garlic beds, and the greenhouses are a jungle of tomato vines. As the harvest comes into readiness, picking berries and pulling garlic takes precedence over weeding. But there are hidden benefits to this disarray and neglect. Nature knows how to take care of herself, and given the opportunity to run her course, life flourishes.

As a gardener and a lover of this beautiful earth that we live on, I am always looking for ways to make our gardens at McKirdy Creek Farm more integrated

and beneficial to our natural environment. Farming on the modern industrial scale has a reputation for degrading the land, but the planet has the capacity for great abundance under better management practices and consideration for the other species that are our neighbors. Ecosystems with a large biodiversity are

more resilient

to environmental disruption, extreme weather events, and pest and disease outbreaks. These ecosystems also provide services such as flood control, clean water, carbon sequestration, and food security (not to mention the priceless health and happiness for those who come in contact with them).

I have come to embrace the natural messiness and life cycles of the garden. Instead of pulling radishes, herbs and leafy greens as they go to seed in the summer, I let some bloom and they draw in an abundance of pollinators and beneficial insects. Instead of cutting and cleaning up perennial

flower and herb beds in the fall, I leave old growth as winter shelter and food for birds and insects, doing the cleanup in the spring as the bumblebees are getting to work.

There are a large range of "pests" on the farm, from large predators who might prey on

> livestock, to deer, insect, bird and rodents looking for an abundant food source. The most effective management of these competitors has been to add natural deterrents and ample habitat beyond our gardens. A barking dog and plenty of woodland and protected grazing keeps the deer and bear away except in the hungriest months. Herbs

and flowers interplanted in the

vegetables help deter and balance insect and rodent pests. In times of extreme

abundance, such as in the

apple harvest, we share with the wildlife and there is more than enough for everyone. We leave buffer zones of native

plants around creeks, waterways and wetlands and these are both havens of life, and some protection against erosion and flooding. Many birds and bats make their homes near water. Insects, including our beloved wild bees and pollinators depend on water. The plants surrounding waterways create a hospitable environment for many animals. The root systems of trees, shrubs

and herbaceous plants hold soil in place

against erosion caused by high water. Wild places to support biodiversity can also be small. Hedges of native bushes and herbs around the garden provide food and shelter for birds, insects, and small mammals. The birds help balance insect pests in the garden. Native bees nest in the ground, wood and stems of this natural setting. Leaving a piece of land populated with native shrubs in their natural state is not only low maintenance, but it also provides habitat for a large range of species. I would recommend everyone keep a little piece of wild close to home, even if it's just a corner of the yard.

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

THE MOON CALENDAR – A USEFUL TOOL FOR FARMING

My parents and grandparents have always farmed with the moon calendar in mind and I have done the same throughout my life. Planting, harvesting, preserving, castrating, butchering, and even putting a new shingle roof on a building - there are good or bad days to do it, according to the moon calendar. It would take too much space to explain it all, but I will try to cover the basics.

We are all aware about low tide and high tide, and each of us probably knows of a person sensitive to the full moon, so it comes with no surprise, that it has an impact in other areas as well.

The 12 signs of the Zodiac (for example ARIES - who "rules" from March 21 to April 19), are also rotating within every month, always in the same order for 2 to 3 days. You'll find them in a Farmer's Almanac Calendar – it will also show Full Moon and New Moon.

There are simple rules for gardening: Root vegetables, as well as the ones that are supposed to form nice "heads", like lettuces or cabbages, should ideally be planted in the period after Full Moon

until the New Moon. Everything else is planted after New Moon until close to Full Moon (but nothing directly on a Full Moon Day).

The Zodiac signs are divided into root days, blossom days, leaf days, and fruit days.

Root days are: TAURUS, VIRGO, and **CAPRICORN**

Blossom days are: GEMINI, LIBRA, and **AQUARIUS**

Leaf days are: CANCER, SCORPIO, and **PISCES**

Fruit days are ARIES, LEO, and **SAGITTARIUS**

Carrots should be planted on root days, flowers on blossom days, chives, lettuces, etc. on leaf days, and tomatoes, peppers, beans, etc. on fruit days.

Ideally you pay attention to the right moon days and a good Zodiac sign, but that is not always possible. I always try to watch out for at least one "rule".

Harvesting vegetables for storage or canning is done best on a TAURUS or CAPRICORN day and/or in the period after Full Moon until the next New Moon.

The best harvesting day for herbs is SCORPIO - the aroma and colour will

keep much better. NEW MOON is the absolute ideal

day to treat plants suffering from

diseases!

Whenever I have piglets that need

to be castrated I pay attention to the Zodiac and Moon Cycle as well. It has to be done in the period after Full Moon until the next New Moon and the Zodiac sign for the day CANNOT be SCORPIO! Butchering should NOT happen on so called water days - PISCES, CANCER, and SCORPIO.

Putting new fence posts in the ground, or roofing should be done in the period after Full Moon until New Moon. We had the same shingle roof on our Mountain Hut for 25 years - exposed to strong winds and no nails to hold it down!

Paying attention to the Moon Calendar has been a good experience for me. I feel closer to the Universe that we are all a part of!
